



New Blow Molder Installation

We are undergoing a transformation in the blow molding department once again. As we continue to have growth in our sprayer business we need new equipment to keep up with this growth, particularly on the Sure Spray and Back

Pack tanks. I will break down the installation of the new equipment that is happening here so that all readers will know the end goal of our new and improved production methods.

First off is the robot and trimmer installation that is in process on Blow Molder #5. We are in the process of installing an automatic trimmer that will de-flash the bottles much like the process on Blow Molder #9 and #10. We are also using a robot to pick and place the bottle from the molder to the trimmer. The new trimmer will also drill the tanks with a servo driven motor which will improve the quality of the drilling process and will be much more repeatable than the old drilling process. The installation involves removing the old bottle trolley and then putting in place the robot and trimmer. This involved some changes to the power and water connections to hook the machines up. This installation will result in a revamped packing line once

completed. The robot and trimmer are currently in place at BM5 and we are actively working on getting the process corrected so that this installation can be successful and we can start using the automatic



trimmer. The end result of this project will have the Sure Spray tanks coming out of the molder, placed into the automatic trimmer where they will be de-flashed and drilled. After the automatic trimmer the bottles will now be ready to be assembled and packed. The goal here is to increase efficiency as we are selling more Sure Spray tanks than ever before.

The next installations happening here are the two molders being called BM#13 and BM#14. These machines will be dedicated to Back Pack tanks. As the Back Pack tank line has grown to include more models being produced, we need more production capabilities on these tanks. The addition of these two machines once installed should help alleviate the constant mold changes on Blow Molder #3 The constant mold changes lead to a loss of efficiency and these two machines will help alleviate that loss thereby increasing our production numbers.

The first machine that is already in place on the production floor is Blow Molder # 13 which resides



next to Blow Molder #4. This machine is an older model machine that is in excellent shape. We are


currently going through the machine to fix any issues and to get it up and running. We are adding a new safety package to the machine that will bring the machine to current safety standards. We have built a new blow stand for the back pack tanks that is installed on the machine. The installation also includes all new electric and water piping to the machine which has been completed. We also have to install new material piping to bring material to the machine. There will be a new packing line including a new quench tank and assembly stations. The current plan is to put the 6" Back Pack tank in this molder.

The second machine that is currently not here at Chapin but is on order for delivery in the next 4-6 weeks will be Blow Molder #14. This is a brand new blow mold machine. dedicated to OPP Back Pack tanks. This machine will reside on the west side of Blow Molder #13. The electricians are currently running wiring to the location that this machine will reside. This machine will also have a brand new quench tank and assembly stations on its packing line. We will be running new material and water lines to the machine once it has arrived here at Chapin. Once here we will learn the controls and how the new machine operates and get it into production as quickly as we can.

The installations of all this equipment here at Chapin is an investment in the company's future and will help us to obtain the increased production numbers we need to keep up with the sales of these tanks.









### Chapin Gustom

One of the things I love most about working in manufacturing is that it easy to see what is being accomplished. You can actually measure when 1000 more sprayers were produced, or 100 new spreaders where shipped.

On the other hand, office work is often invisible until there is a major event. The last three years we have been working on growing Chapin though another acquisition. It came with great excitement that on June 29th Chapin purchased the assets of Quality Blow Molding and formed Chapin Custom Molding, joining Specialty Solution's, Heath Outdoor Products and Chapin Spreaders to the Chapin family of businesses

As some may have noticed, Brian Evertt has been gone for the last few weeks with Scott Fisher moving into the role of Plant Superintendent, while Brian accepted the position of General Manger of Chapin Custom Molding in Elyria, Ohio. He has been in Elyria for almost a month now getting ready to begin operations, find a place to live and even secure new customers including Little Tikes and Husqvarna. Ask any of Batavia's material handlers and they will attest, the Batavia plant has been getting increasingly crowed. Chapin's

success in compressed air and backpack sprayers have led to the need for even more production and warehouse space. Just a few years ago we weren't sure how we would be able to use all that 'extra' space. Now we are working on getting more!

New equipment is already on its way to production. Next to BM4, BM13 is nearly up and running, as well as a new machine BM14 that will be delivered around the middle of August. These machines are going to be producing even more backpack sprayers. With all that new business, the ATV products will have to be moved out.

Chapin Custom Molding allowed us to meet two of our goals in one move. First, we will be able to move BM8 and BM12 to the new facility to make room for compressed air and backpack sprayers in Batavia. Second, Chapin can enter the custom molding market as a supplier to other manufactures that we already do some business with, or would like to in the future.

With new opportunity comes new challenges. At only 80,000 square feet, Chapin Custom Molding houses a staggering 30 blow molding machines. At any given time about a third of them are running, but they are crammed into the building to maximize the space. This makes for a very tight working environment. As you can see there is only some 12 feet from the machine to the wall! There are two large warehouses outside of the area that will be able to fit the ATV business and extra stock.

Custom molding doesn't normally produce complete products, but parts that go into products. One of their larger volume items are the blower tubes for leaf blowers. It's the only part of that machine that comes out of the new facility. Likewise, in the first week we were molding just the pillars for a ride in toy car, and just the handle for a wagon. Most of the time a part is trimmed and put into a Gaylord for shipment. Very little stock is held as it's done mostly on a just-in-time basis for other customers. So while the molding is difficult and varied, the assembly and pack out is minimal.

It's exciting to be at the helm of a new business again and jump start another product line. Brian Evertt is an outstanding Airman, did a great job at both Clarence and Batavia, and I know he will again bring success and discipline to another business unit.

































































# BOOK Reviews


