

I have included this chart from an unknown author as I think it simply outlines the positive responses we can have to adverse events.



Kentucky Happenings

As we move ever closer to Summer and some much nicer weather; it is good time to remind all our employees to enjoy your days outside but please stay diligent in protecting yourselves from not only the bright Kentucky sun but to ensure you stay properly hydrated in and out of work.

The local news channels always post the UV index for the day this is something that all should be aware of. The UV Index is accompanied by recommendations for sun protection and is a useful tool for planning sun-safe outdoor activities. To help avoid over exposure, sun burns, and the possibility of skin cancer stay diligent and prepare yourself with sunscreen of at least an SPF 15 rating. Also do not be fooled by outside temperature, this has no bearing on the chances of getting a sunburn.

A Boy Scout Troop Leader called and asked if he could get a discount on some bat houses for his project. We gave him a discount and he finished the project. Here is his response:



The Elyria Plant has continued to see some unexpected new products come into the production mix. This has helped us out quite a bit with our sales for the year. Some of the products have been from existing customers that needed us to be able to take on their overflow work, as well as old customers coming back after a hiatus. Furthermore, the Elyria Plant is starting to see the planned new products hitting the production floor. Some of these new products include drainage sumps, some medical supplies, and even aftermarket auto parts.

In addition to new products in Elyria, we are starting the transition making from and assembling the ATVtanks making and to assembling the small hose end bottles and 48oz

sprayers. We have pulled the remaining 25 gallon mold, blow stands and cutting fixture and transferred them down to the KY plant. We have also started to transfer some of the components down to the KY plant.

The Chapin Express will be busy this summer with this transition. We anticipate the small bottle assembly parts to start to filter in during the summer months.

While we are in this transition, the assembly crew has been moved down to the main Elyria facility to help keep all of the presses running on the off shifts. They have been a big help filling in on the crews that are short staffed.

The rebuild of press 28 is in the home stretch. There are only a few odds and ends left to be completed. We are anxiously awaiting the electric company to finish the install on the power coming into the building to complete this process.



1st Shift Maintenence Team

Eric Hurd and his maintenance team have been working hard to continue making improvements around the plant. A central vac system has been one of those improvements. It has allowed us to move the raw material around the building in a more efficient manner. This also helps keep the contamination down. Other projects that are in the works are a new screw and motor for press 6 as well as a rebuild on the heads on press 18. All of these improvements move us toward being more efficient and providing us with better yields.

Connie Hill in HR has put together a "Buddy System" for our facility to help with our training program. This will include both employees who are directly hired by Chapin, AND any new personnel that are sent to CCM from a temp agency. Active, hourly, hired in, CCM employees can sign up to mentor and be a buddy for these new hires. The goal is to provide some extra encouragement, support, advice, and perhaps some additional training, to those that are new to Chapin. We hope this helps with employee retention and longevity with the company.

Additionally, Connie has put together a cross training program for the summer months to upskill employees. This will help fill some gaps with summer vacations and help prepare employees for the skills they will need when working toward promotions on the floor.

Ndërsa jemi në këtë tranzicion, ekipi i montimit është zhvendosur në objektin kryesor të Elyria për të ndihmuar që të gjitha presat të funksionojnë edhe jashtë turneve. Ata kanë qenë një ndihmë e madhe për plotësimin e ekipeve me staf të paktë.

Rindërtimi i presës 28 është shumë pranë përfundimit. Kanë mbetur vetëm disa pjesë të vogla për t'u përfunduar. Ne jemi duke pritur me padurim kompaninë elektrike për të përfunduar instalimin e energjisë elektrike që hyn në ndërtesë për të përfunduar këtë proces.

Eric Hurd dhe ekipi i tij i mirëmbajtjes kanë punuar shumë për të vazhduar përmirësimin përreth fabrikës. Një sistem qendror ajrimi ka qenë një nga këto përmirësime. Ai na ka lejuar të lëvizim lëndën e parë nëpër ndërtesë në një mënyrë më efikase. Kjo gjithashtu ndihmon në uljen e ndotjes. Projekte të tjera që janë në punë janë një vidë dhe motor i ri për presën 6 si dhe një rindërtim në kokat e presës 18. Të gjitha këto përmirësime na shtyjnë të jemi më efikasë dhe na ofrojnë rendiment më të mirë pune.

Connie Hill në HR ka krijuar një "Sistem Buddy" për objektin tonë për të ndihmuar me programin tonë të trajnimit. Kjo do të përfshijë si punonjësit që punësohen drejtpërdrejt nga Chapin, ashtu edhe çdo personel të ri që dërgohet në CCM nga një agjenci e përkohshme. Punonjësit aktivë, çdo orë, të punësuar në CCM, mund të regjistrohen si mentorë dhe të jenë shokë për këto punonjës të rinj. Qëllimi është që të ofrohet inkurajim, mbështetje, këshilla dhe ndoshta disa trajnime shtesë, atyre që janë të rinj në Chapin. Shpresojmë që kjo të ndihmojë me mbajtjen e punonjësve dhe qëndrimin e tyre për një kohë të gjatë me kompaninë.

Për më tepër, Connie ka krijuar një program trajnimi për muajt e verës për të përmirësuar aftësitë e punonjësve. Kjo do të ndihmojë në plotësimin e disa boshllëqeve me pushimet verore dhe do të ndihmojë në përgatitjen e punonjësve për aftësitë që do të kenë nevojë kur të ngrihen në pozicione më të larta pune.



Mark Volpe loved nature, and as that became apparent to CEO Jim Campbell, Campbell gave him a job only suitable to a conservationist -- manager of the private nature preserve behind the Chapin Manufacturing factory on Ellicott Street in Batavia.

Volpe worked for Chapin for 35 years with much of that time dedicated to the care and maintenance of the 70-acre preserve. He died in November 2018.

In addressing visitors at the conservation area Friday, Campbell stressed the importance of staying on the marked trails while explaining the slice of nature Volpe tended.

"This 70 acres encompasses meadows, hardwood forests, lowlands, wetlands, and actually open water," Campbell said. "It's quite a diverse ecosystem."

Volpe's dedication to the preserve was marked today with a ribbon-cutting by his widow Louise Volpe on a bridge that now ties together the east side and the west side of the property.

Volpe's children and grandchildren were also present to walk with Louise across the bridge for the first time.

"He just enjoyed coming out here," Louise said. "I would come out here with him. He loved nature, the earth, and everything about it. He was just that kind of person who is an outdoorsman. He loved it. That's why he jumped at the opportunity to take over out here when Jimmy asked him, so I think that was kind of special what Jim did."

The bridge was actually Mark Volpe's idea. The property is divided by a wide, shallow stream, so to access the conservation area, one would have to come in either from the east or west side and not be able to cross over.

"Mark did plan this before his passing," Campbell said. "He was working with his good friend Jeff McGivern. Jeff and his crew actually built this bridge. This bridge is actually a repurposed dragline. For those who don't know what a dragline is, it's really like a big crane. This was the boom of a dragline that Jeff repurposed. It's 110 feet long. Maybe it doesn't look that great, but it actually can hold probably about seven or eight tons. So it's very safe."

Mark's brother is John Volpe, who is also active locally in environmental causes.

Volpe's daughter Melissa Miller closed the private ceremony with a thank you message for Campbell and everybody at Chapin.

"We would like to thank everyone at Chapin's who created this memorial in honor of my dad," she said. "As you all know, he devoted his life to his family and his job here at Chapin's. He also had many hobbies and activities that he loved. One of his favorites was spending time outdoors with nature. He was extremely passionate about it and found profound meaning in all things relating to nature. We are extremely grateful and honored that you are remembering him in such a beautiful and special way in a way that embodies who he truly was, and in a place that he loved so much. This tribute means so much to all of us. And I know my dad would be honored and so happy to be remembered this way."

Employees of Chapin's are welcome to visit the conservation area at any time. The rest of the public is allowed to hike the property with the company's prior permission. There is no hunting or fishing permitted on the property. Visitors are required to stay on trails, both to protect the environment and for their own safety.

First Aid & CPR: First Aid Responders at Chapin

Reality Check: 350,000 people suffer cardiacarrest outside of the hospital each year. Out of that number, only 10% of people survive.*

On May 22, Chapin teamed up with Lancaster Volunteer Fire Department and Jim Fontaine to train staff members on basic first aid and CPR. These team members are also first aid responders in our office and on the production floor. Each team member received a detailed first aid kit, CPR mask and guide after finishing the training. Recertification is required every two years.

The team learned:

- Scene assessment, finding the problem
- First aid basics: bleeding and bandaging, tourniquets, allergic reactions and EPI Pen use, choking
- Recognizing and assisting heart attack, stroke and seizures
- Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) use
- Adult CPR and AED Use: beats only and rescue breaths

If you witness an emergency at work:

- Call for your supervisor and first responder
- Check the scene and keep unneeded people from crowding the area until the responder arrives

Reality Check: giving basic first aid treatment before a medical professional arrives helps save lives.

Chapin Human Resources is also offering Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) or Certified First Responder (CFR) training.

If fully trained and certified, you will be helping Chapin if needed during a medical emergency.

CFR's are required to complete in depth training, on site, demonstrate competency and pass a written exam. CFR and EMT, both NY state licensed, are valid for three years and you need to keep a current CPR card. For those interested in EMT training, those details can be discussed as training is more complex.





- Know the terrain you are going to hike. Gather some information on how rigorous and rough the trail is before setting off. Know your limits. How far can you comfortably walk? Take into account the steepness of the trail and any obstacles you may have to climb over. If it's a straight trail remember you have to hike back to get to your starting point.
- Do not hike alone. Bring a friend or family member. There is safety in numbers and someone to back you up in case you get injured. Cell phone reception can be non-existent in remote areas.
- Let someone know about your planned excursion and when you expect to return.
- Let the person in your party who walks most slowly set the pace.
- Stay on the trail. It may be tempting to explore but if you are hiking in a large area it can be easy to get lost.
- Establish your position on a compass when you start your hike and keep it handy in case you get lost. Notice landmarks as you hike and use them as reference points. Sometimes trails are not clearly marked or start to fade if they are not well traveled.
- Bring plenty of water 1 quart for every two hours. Pack some snacks too because you may need a boost of

energy as you exert yourself. Don't drink water from a running stream even though it looks clear and clean.

- Wear shoes with good support, preferably waterproof in case you have to walk through a shallow stream.
- Check the weather so you can address appropriately and avoid storms.
- Where a hat and sunscreen to protect your skin.
- Wear bug spray.
- If you are hiking in an area where ticks are likely to be present wear long lightweight pants and tuck them into your hiking boots or shoes. Use insect repellent that deters ticks. Inspect your skin and clothes after finishing your hike to make sure that ticks are not hitchhiking home with you.
- Get to know what poison ivy looks like and steer clear of it.
- Bring some bandages and Neosporin with you in case you get a cut or scratch.
- Do not approach or touch wildlife. Report any aggressive, sick or injured animals to park rangers if they are available, or contact a local police station to find out how to get help.


